

District 12 Current Middle School Zones





Current Middle School Zoning and Admissions

- Middle schools in District 12 are geographically concentrated in the western portion of the district.
- District 12 has 15 schools that serve middle school grades, of which six offer a zoned priority for admissions.
- District 12 is currently split between zoned and non-zoned areas for middle school.
 - Approximately 46% of sixth graders living in District 12 currently do not have a zoned school.
- Students who enroll in middle school in District 12 tend to exercise choice across the many middle school options, regardless of their zoning.




Why Unzone District 12 Middle Schools?

- Current zone lines do not properly account for school size.
 - M.S. 129 is over 100% utilization and has a large zone, while J.H.S. 98 and I.S. 190 have relatively low enrollment and have a very small shared zone.
- An unzoning would standardize zoning across the district, making zoning and admissions more consistent for families and schools.
- District 12 is relatively small and students already exercise choice, so travel hardships are anticipated to be minimal.
 - 61% of 6th grade students who reside in a zoned area of District 12 and attend a District 12 school enroll in a school other than their zoned school.
 - The longest commute from any point in District 12 to any middle school is 2.3 miles.
- On average, the six zoned schools only draw 31% of their enrollment from their zone.

Effects of Middle School Unzoning

- Students and residents of District 12 would receive equal geographic priority to district middle schools, and admissions would be standardized across the district.
- Student and parent choice would be the primary driver of middle school admissions.
- Students residing in currently zoned areas would no longer have a zoned priority to a middle school based on home address, but would still have access to the wide range of middle school options in the district.
- If the unzoning is approved by the CEC, it will take effect for the 2020-2021 school year.



Standard Policies

When: Pending approval by the CEC, any proposed zoning changes would take effect for the 2020-2021 academic year.

Who: Proposed changes would primarily impact incoming sixth grade students, and new students to the system. All currently enrolled students in grades 6-8 may remain in their school until graduation.

Standard Admissions Policies: All impacted schools will continue to admit students according to Chancellor's regulation A-101.

Standard Busing Policies: The Office of Pupil Transportation (OPT) will follow standard procedure to determine bus service eligibility of general education students, as outlined by Chancellor's regulation A-801.
