

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#### CITYWIDE TRENDS

#### CITYWIDE ENROLLMENT (DISTRICT AND CHARTER), 2013-14 TO 2022-23

New York City Public Schools (NYCPS) is committed to thoughtful collaboration with districts and communities to collectively strengthen schools, support students and families, and respond to demographic and population changes in New York City.

• K-12 enrollment in District 1-32 schools and charter schools has declined by about 12% since its peak in the 2016-2017 school year, exacerbated by population changes during the COVID-19 pandemic.

#### DISTRICT PLANNING PROCESS

- The Office of District Planning partners with communities, superintendents, and other stakeholders to identify solutions that address district needs, in accordance with Chancellor's Regulations A-185 and A-190.
  - **Chancellor's Regulation A-185** governs the process to re-zone or unzone schools in partnership with and voted on by Community Education Councils (CECs).
  - Chancellor's Regulation A-190 governs the process to make any major changes to school utilization such as co-locations, school mergers, grade expansions and truncations, re-sitings, and other changes. A-190 proposals are voted on by the Panel for Educational Policy (PEP).
- Guiding Questions:

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- How might recent changes affect the needs of the district as they are implemented? Do they address key needs and priorities?
- What other school changes could be considered?

  - Are students remaining in the district to attend school? If not, where are they going?



- Over the last five years, total enrollment in District 13 has declined by 9%.
  - Enrollment decline has been most significant at the elementary and middle school levels, which saw five-year enrollment declines of 17% and 15% respectively.
- In the last year, total enrollment in District 13 has declined by 2%.
  - Notably, enrollment at the elementary school level stabilized with only a 1% decline.
- District 13 has more students enrolled in high school than in early childhood, elementary, and middle school combined, likely due to a few large and highly competitive high schools that students travel into the district to attend.

#### DISTRICT SCHOOL ENROLLMENT







- Over the past five years, the number of elementary school-aged children in District 13 has declined by approximately 8.5%.
  - Approximately 52% of District 13 elementary residents are enrolled in a district school either within or outside of District 13, which is down from 56% five years ago.
  - Approximately 28% of District 13 elementary residents attend a non-public school, which is an increase of approximately 5 percentage points over the past five school years.




- Over the past five years, the number of middle school-aged children in District 13 has fluctuated, though it has consistently decreased since the 2019-2020 school year.
  - 43% of middle school-aged residents in District 13 attend a district school either within or outside of District 13, which is down from 52% in 2017-2018.
  - A greater share of District 13 middle school-aged residents attend charter and non-public schools than five years ago.
- Compared to the rest of Brooklyn, District 15 has average elementary school retention, and below average middle school retention.





#### Middle School Students – District of Residence





- 65% of middle school students enrolled in District 13 district schools reside in District 13, while a combined 21% reside in Districts 14, 16, 17, and 19.




- From the 2021-22 to the 2022-23 school year, 52% of fifth grade students articulated to a District 13 middle school, which is a decrease from 57% four years ago.
- The percentage of students articulating to non-public schools has increased since the 2019-2020 school year.

- District 13 has 11 elementary schools in the bottom 25% of enrollment citywide, and all but one of those schools have seen enrolment declines of at least 12% over the past five school years.
- District 13 has seven middle schools in the bottom 25% of enrollment citywide, and five of those schools have seen enrollment declines over the past five school years.



- Three of the five most in-demand elementary schools in District 13 (P.S. 20 Clinton Hill (13K020), P.S. 9 The Sarah Smith Garnet School (13K009), and P.S. 133 William A. Butler (13K133)) have dual language programs.
- The two most in-demand middle school options in District 13 have either an ASD Horizon program or a District 75 inclusion program.

#### SEAT DEMAND

- We consider the total number of students and the total number of seats to see if there is a net surplus or deficit of seats within a district.
- Some districts, and particular areas within a district, struggle with over-utilization, while others have excess capacity.
- Guiding Questions:
  - Are there certain parts of the district with significant excess space? Areas of crowding or over-utilization?
  - How does projected enrollment compare to capacity and how do we expect that to change over time?
  - o Do projections align with current, on-the-ground experience?

- Currently there are roughly 2,580 excess elementary school seats and 1,129 excess middle school seats in District 13.
- District 13 is expected to continue to have excess seats at the elementary and middle school level over the next several years as enrollment is trending downward and new capacity is scheduled to open.
- K748 will open in the 2023-2024 school year and will temporarily house Design Works (13K963) before ultimately serving as elementary school capacity.

# SCHOOL & BUILDING UTILIZATION WITHIN THE DISTRICT


- The Office of District Planning works closely with the School Construction Authority (SCA) and the Office of Space Management to understand how buildings are currently used and how capacity can best be used in future years.
- Each year, the SCA publishes the Blue Book, a tool that analyzes the capacity of each NYCPS building across the City and compares the target capacity with the number of enrolled students to determine a utilization rate for the building.
- Guiding Questions:
  - Given the current and projected capacity trends presented in the preceding Demand and Capacity section, does the district have sufficient capacity to meet its needs and support its students?
  - o Is over- or under-utilization concentrated at a particular grade level? In a particular area?
  - Are there under-utilized buildings with excess capacity to accommodate an additional school or program?


Under-utilized Buildings in District 13 with 300+ Excess Seats

- Utilization rates do not always capture the full narrative of space in a building, but provide a starting point for assessing potential space availability. For example, some buildings, although under-utilized, may not have sufficient space to add another school.
- Other buildings with significant excess seats could be candidates to address pressing district needs, including housing another school or adding or expanding programs such as dual language offerings, District 75 programming, Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) programs, Gifted and Talented, and/or other district needs.
- K805 houses Urban Assembly School of Music and Art (13K350), Science Skills Center High School for Science, Technology and the Creative Arts (13K419), and Brooklyn International High School (13K439) and has 710 excess seats, the most excess space of any building in District 13.

#### DISTRICT 13 BUILDINGS OVER 100% UTILIZATION




Buildings Over 100% Utilization in District 13

- There are 2 buildings in District 13 operating at over 120% utilization.
- The Office of District Planning seeks to work with superintendents, CECs, and partner offices to alleviate overcrowding through the leveraging of available capacity.

# DISTRICT 75

- NYCPS's District 75 provides highly specialized instructional support for students with significant challenges, such as ASD, significant cognitive delays, emotional disturbance, sensory impairment, and multiple disabilities.
- District 75 serves students through a number of different program models designed for students of different ages and education needs.
  - Most District 75 students attend Special Class programs, which operate as distinct schools and may be located in standalone sites or co-located with district schools
  - A smaller number of students attend Inclusion Programs, in which students receive District 75 services within general education classes at a district school partner.
- Guiding Questions:
  - Does the district have a need for more District 75 seats?
  - Are there potential options for new D75 sites to provide opportunities for students to attend programs closer to their homes?


# District 13 D75 Special Class Enrollment by Year




• District 13 elementary and middle schools serve a larger percentage of Black students and a lower percentage of Hispanic students and Asian students than the Brooklyn and City averages.

# 6-8 Race/Ethnicity, Schools Serving MS Grades






