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CITYWIDE ENROLLMENT (DISTRICT AND CHARTER), 2016-17 TO 2025-26

New York City Public Schools (NYCPS) is committed to thoughtful collaboration with districts and communities to collectively strengthen schools, support students and families, and respond to demographic and population changes in New York City.

- Enrollment in District 1-32 schools decreased by about 3% in 2025-2026. While enrollment has been relatively stable for the past three years, this year's decline is the largest since the steeper declines following the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Citywide, K-12 enrollment in District 1-32 schools and charter schools has declined by about 14% since its peak in the 2016-2017 school year.

District 22 Enrollment by Grade Level and Year (District Schools Only)

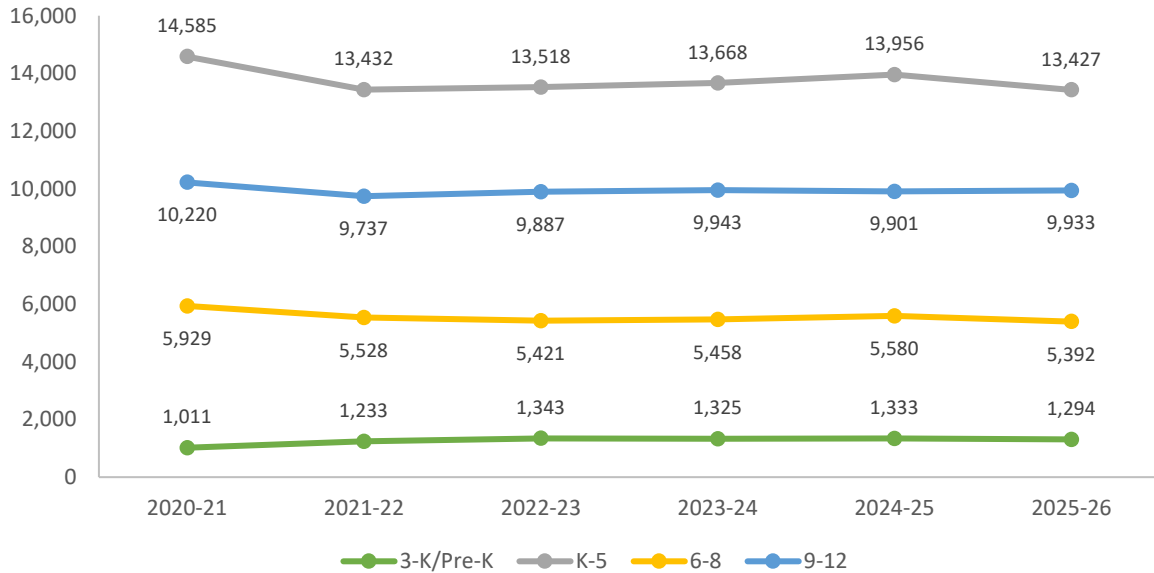

District 22 K-12 Enrollment vs. Residential Population

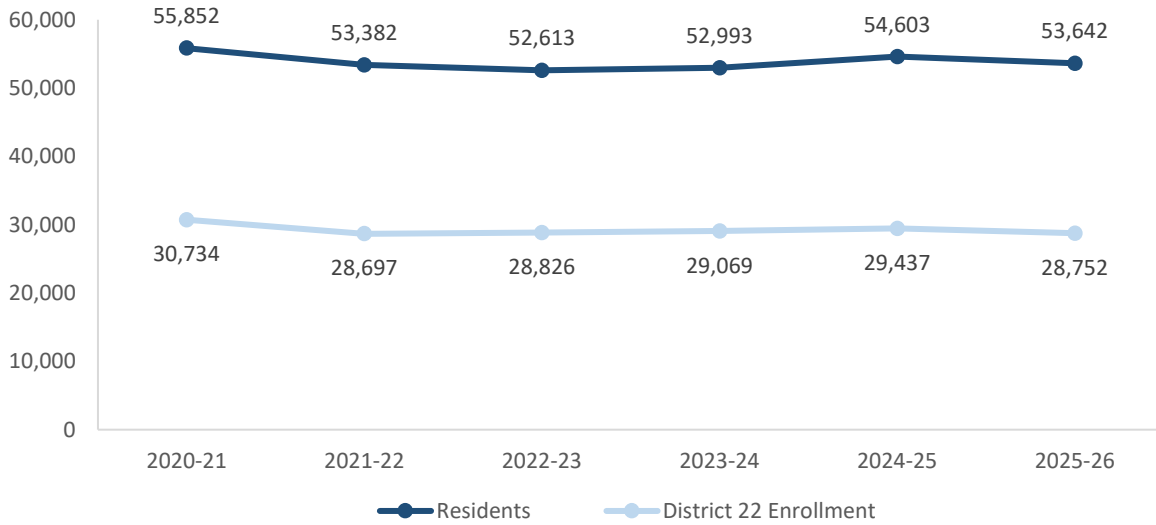

- Citywide, the average **District Enrollment Rate** (the percent of students enrolled in district schools who live in that district) is 83% for ES and 76% for MS.

Students Leaving the District:

- At the elementary school level, the largest number of students leaving District 22 enroll in non-public schools. Since 2020-21, this number has remained about the same, as compared to the overall number of elementary school-aged residents, which has decreased by 6%.
- At the middle school level, the largest number of students leaving District 22 enroll in non-public schools. Since 2020-21, this number has remained about the same, as compared to the overall number of middle school-aged residents, which has decreased by 5%.

Students Coming into the District:

- At the elementary school level, a smaller number of students living in other districts come into District 22 schools (1,222) than District 22 residents who leave for other district schools (1,800).
- At the middle school level, a smaller number of students living in other districts come into District 22 schools (703) than District 22 residents who leave for other district schools (2,610).

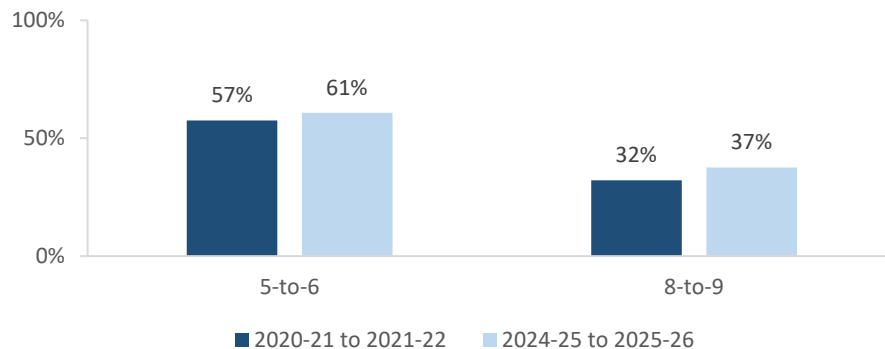

District 22 Students Remaining in District the Following Year



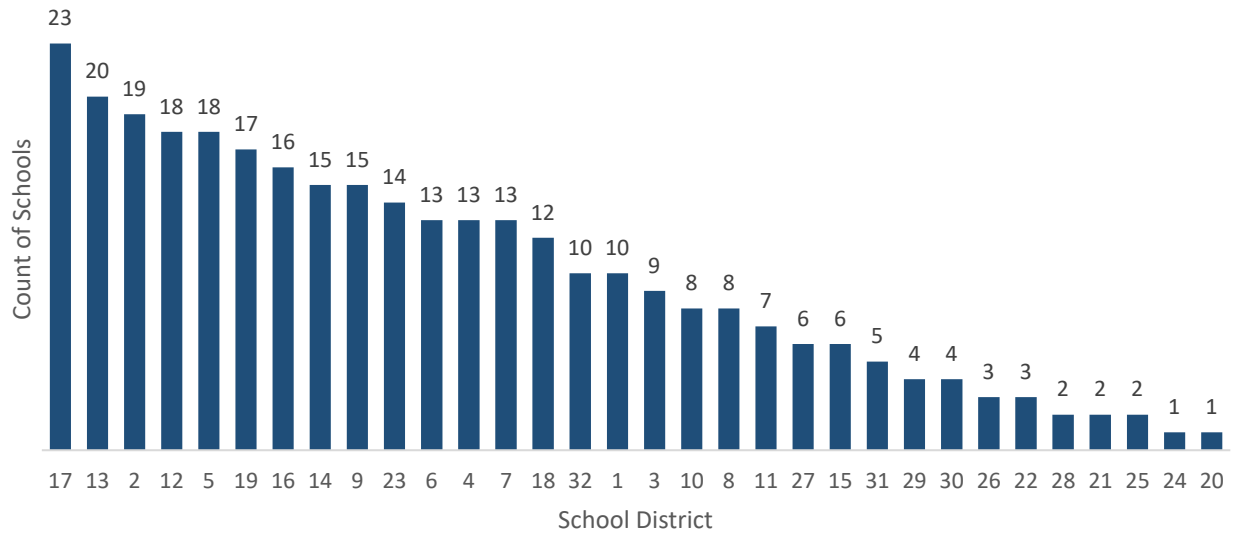

DISTRICT 75

NYCPS’s District 75 provides specialized instructional support for students with significant challenges, such as Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD), significant cognitive delays, emotional disability, sensory impairment, and multiple disabilities. District 75 serves students through a number of different program models.

- Most District 75 students attend Special Class programs, which operate as distinct schools and may be located in standalone sites or co-located with district schools.
- A smaller number of students attend Inclusion Programs, in which students receive District 75 services within general education classes at a district school partner.

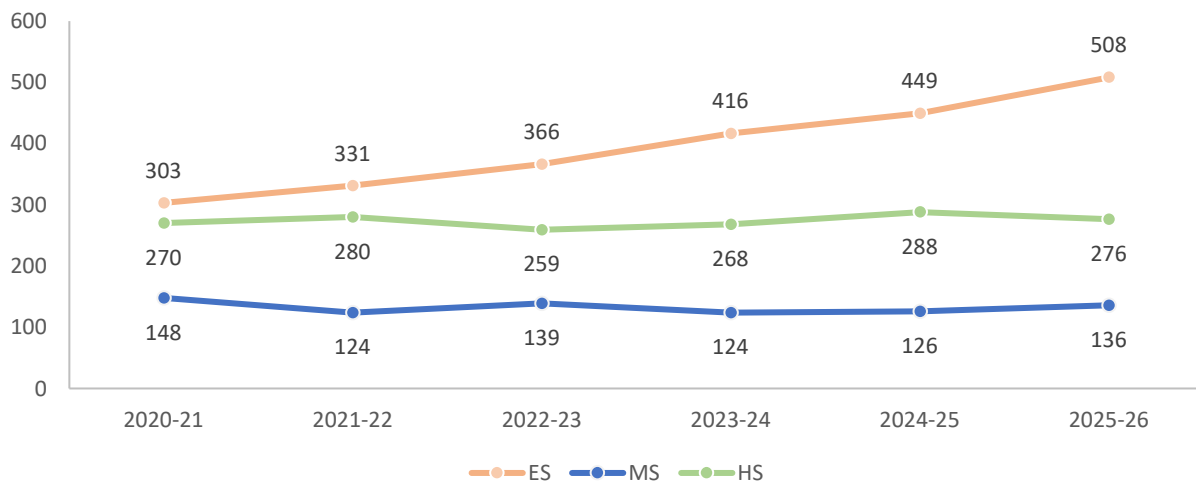

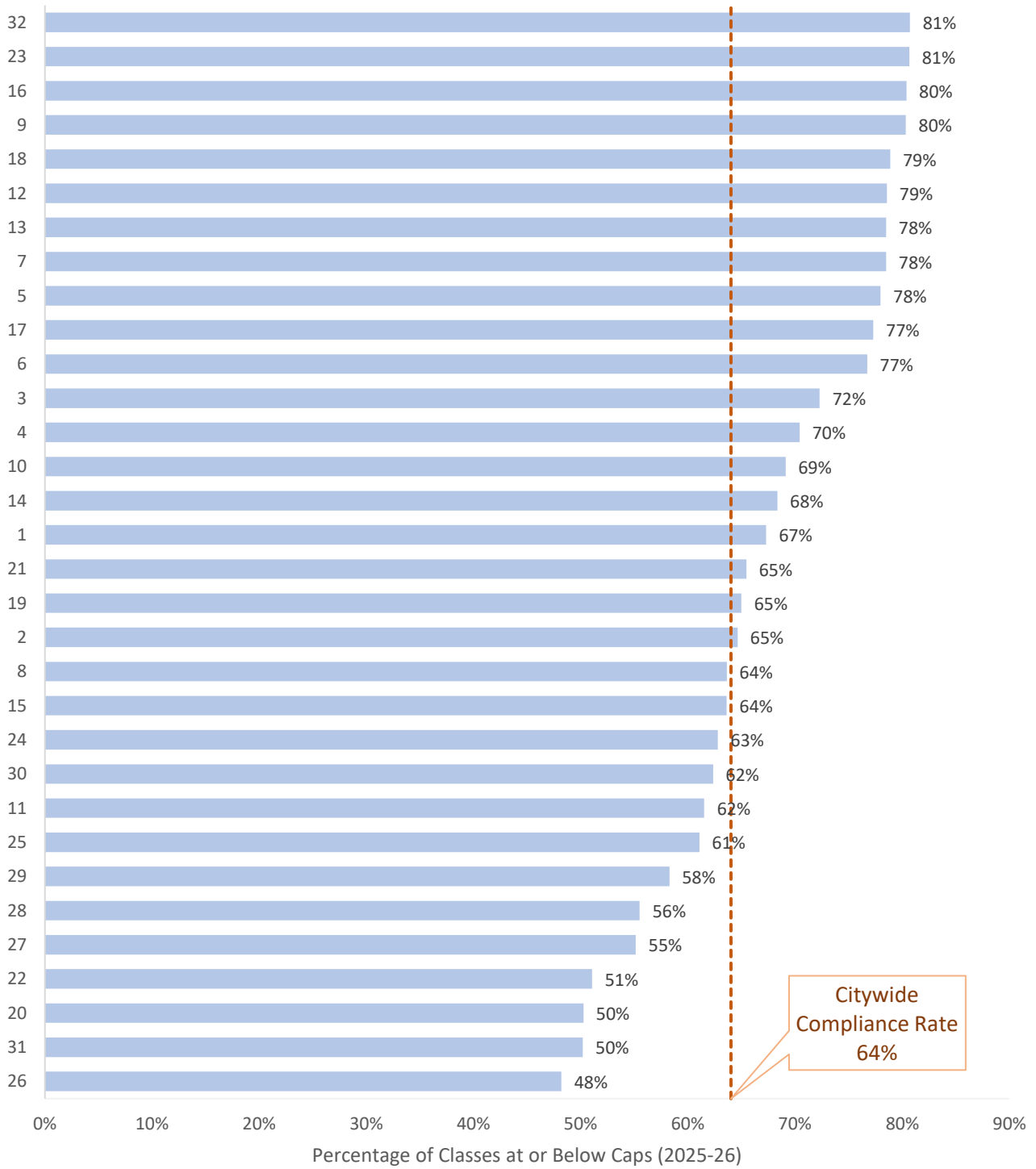

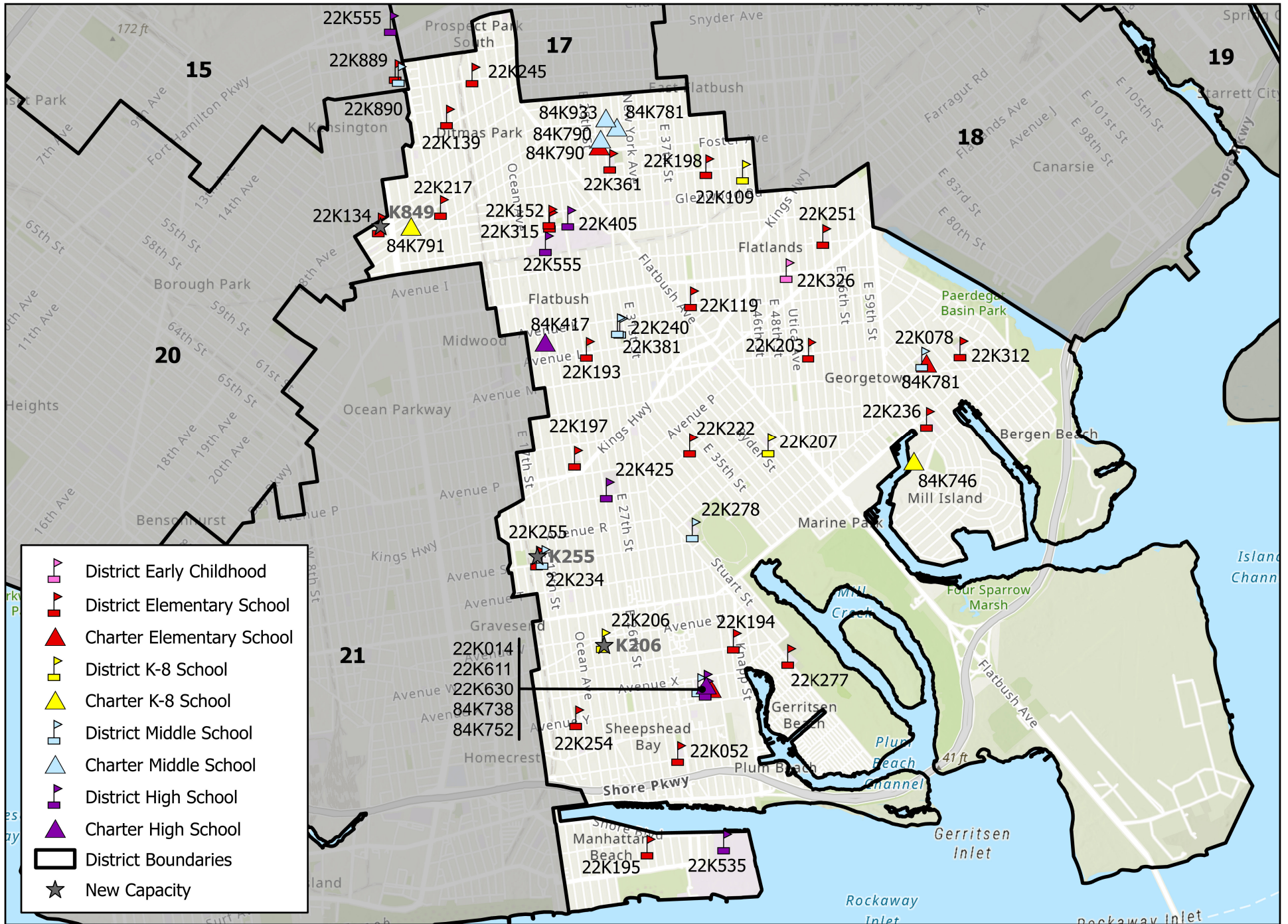
