

CITYWIDE TRENDS

CITYWIDE ENROLLMENT (DISTRICT AND CHARTER), 2013-14 TO 2022-23

New York City Public Schools (NYCPS) is committed to thoughtful collaboration with districts and communities to collectively strengthen schools, support students and families, and respond to demographic and population changes in New York City.

• K-12 enrollment in District 1-32 schools and charter schools has declined by about 12% since its peak in the 2016-2017 school year, exacerbated by population changes during the COVID-19 pandemic.

DISTRICT PLANNING PROCESS

- The Office of District Planning partners with communities, superintendents, and other stakeholders to identify solutions that address district needs, in accordance with Chancellor's Regulations A-185 and A-190.
 - **Chancellor's Regulation A-185** governs the process to re-zone or unzone schools in partnership with and voted on by Community Education Councils (CECs).
 - Chancellor's Regulation A-190 governs the process to make any major changes to school utilization such as co-locations, school mergers, grade expansions and truncations, re-sitings, and other changes. A-190 proposals are voted on by the Panel for Educational Policy (PEP).
- Guiding Questions:
 - How might recent changes affect the needs of the district as they are implemented? Do they address key needs and priorities?
 - What other school changes could be considered?

CHANGES IN DISTRICT - 2020-21 TO 2023-24

- Beginning in the 2023-2024 school year, P.S./M.S. 47 will be served in new building Q343.
- Subsequently, Waterside Children's Studio School will be re-sited to Q593 (formally Stella Maris), and the middle school grades of Success Academy Far Rockaway will be re-sited from Q053 to Q225 and co-located with Waterside School for Leadership.

 - Are students remaining in the district to attend school? If not, where are they going?



- Total high school enrollment has increased since the 2017-2018 school year, reaching its peak in the 2019-2020 school year.

DISTRICT SCHOOL ENROLLMENT




District 27 Schools - K-5 and 6-8 Enrollment

- Since the 2019-2020 school year, district elementary enrollment in District 27 has declined 14%.
- Similarly, district middle school enrollment has declined by 13% in the same time period.
- These trends are comparable across the borough:
 - K-5 enrollment in district schools in Queens is down 13% over the last three years, and 6-8 total enrollment has declined 12%.



- Over the past five years, the number of elementary school-aged children residing in District 27 has declined by 16%.
- The share of residents enrolling in district schools in District 27 has decreased, while the share of residents enrolling in charters has grown.
- Charter enrollment at the elementary school level has increased across Queens, particularly in Districts 24, 27, 28, and 29.




- Over the past five years, the number of middle school-aged children residing in District 27 has declined by 9%. Enrollment in district schools in District 27 and non-public schools has declined.
- While the population of middle school-aged residents decreased, enrollment in charter middle schools has increased significantly over the past five years, from 465 in the 2017-2018 school year to 733 in the 2022-2023 school year. Charter enrollment at the middle school level has increased across Queens.
- The share of residents enrolling in district schools in District 27 has decreased, while the share of residents enrolling in charters has grown.

Elementary School Students




Middle School Students



% of Students Attending Home District Middle Schools



Middle School Students – District of Residence






- Retention at district elementary and middle schools is low in District 27 compared to the rest of Queens. When compared to South Queens though, middle school retention is highest in District 27.




- Articulation patterns between fifth and sixth grades in District 27 have remained stable over the past three years.

- District 27 enrollment in district elementary schools has declined 20% over the past five years. Several schools with enrollment in the lowest 25% citywide have declined at a higher rate, as listed above.
 - Zone sizes have decreased at Lighthouse and P.S. 45 over this same period, suggesting that the number of residents in these areas have decreased.
 - P.S./M.S. 47 and P.S. 96 are designed to be a small schools and both have organizational capacities below 250, prompting construction. Demand is not of concern at these schools.
 - Similarly P.S. 51 serves grades K-1 with a pre-K program, and only has an organizational capacity of 130 students.
- Zone enrollment is relatively low at M.S. 53 and Waterside School for Leadership, as shown above.
- While still under 250 students, enrollment at M.S. 53 has increased over the past two years.



- P.S. 377, Queens Explorers, and Hawtree Creek Middle School all opened in the past ten years.
- P.S. 108 has a Gifted & Talented (G&T) program, which likely contributes to demand.
- Scholars' Academy is a 6-12 school with significant unmet demand.

SEAT DEMAND

- We consider the total number of students and the total number of seats to see if there is a net surplus or deficit of seats within a district.
- Some districts, and particular areas within a district, struggle with over-utilization, while others have excess capacity.
- Guiding Questions:
 - Are there certain parts of the district with significant excess space? Areas of crowding or over-utilization?
 - How does projected enrollment compare to capacity and how do we expect that to change over time?
 - o Do projections align with current, on-the-ground experience?

SCHOOL & BUILDING UTILIZATION WITHIN THE DISTRICT


- The Office of District Planning works closely with the School Construction Authority (SCA) and the Office of Space Management to understand how buildings are currently used and how capacity can best be used in future years.
- Each year, the SCA publishes the Blue Book, a tool that analyzes the capacity of each NYCPS building across the City and compares the target capacity with the number of enrolled students to determine a utilization rate for the building.
- <u>Guiding Questions:</u>
 - Given the current and projected capacity trends presented in the preceding Demand and Capacity section, does the district have sufficient capacity to meet its needs and support its students?
 - o Is over- or under-utilization concentrated at a particular grade level? In a particular area?
 - Are there under-utilized buildings with excess capacity to accommodate an additional school or program?


DISTRICT 27 UNDER-UTILIZED BUILDINGS

- Utilization rates do not always capture the full narrative of space in a building, but provide a starting . point for assessing potential space availability. For example, some buildings, although under-utilized, may not have sufficient space to add another school.
- Other buildings with significant excess seats could be candidates to address pressing district needs, • including housing another school or adding or expanding programs such as dual language offerings, District 75 programming, Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) programs, Gifted and Talented, and/or other district needs.
- Q410 (Beach Channel) and Q400 (August Martin) are both high school campuses with multiple co-• located schools and programs in each building.
- The middle school grades of Success Academy Far Rockaway (84Q375) in Building Q053 are re-sited • to Q225 for the 2023-2024 school year. As a result, Q053 is projected to have more than 300 excess seats for the 2023-2024 school year.

- P.S. 96 is receiving an addition to address over-utilization as described on page 16.



TRANSPORTABLE CLASSROOM UNITS (TCUS)

- NYCPS is replacing TCUs at P.S. 96 with an addition.
- TCUs remain at P.S. 106 and P.S. 232 without plans for removal.

DISTRICT 75

- NYCPS's District 75 provides highly specialized instructional support for students with significant challenges, such as ASD, significant cognitive delays, emotional disturbance, sensory impairment, and multiple disabilities.
- District 75 serves students through a number of different program models designed for students of different ages and education needs.
 - Most District 75 students attend Special Class programs, which operate as distinct schools and may be located in standalone sites or co-located with district schools
 - A smaller number of students attend Inclusion Programs, in which students receive District 75 services within general education classes at a district school partner.
- Guiding Questions:
 - Does the district have a need for more District 75 seats?
 - Are there potential options for new D75 sites to provide opportunities for students to attend programs closer to their homes?




District 27 D75 Special Class Enrollment by Year





K-5 Race/Ethnicity, Schools Serving ES Grades




6-8 Race/Ethnicity, Schools Serving MS Grades


Economically Disadvantaged (K-8)


