## **Instructions for Completing the Quarterly Report**

Quarterly reports summarize your child's academic progress, including subjects covered and total instructional hours. These reports are due four times a year, as outlined in your Individualized Home Instruction Plan (IHIP). If homeschooling begins mid-year, reports should cover the remaining instruction period.

## **Each report must include:**

- The total number of instructional hours your child completed during the quarter.
- A description of the material covered in each subject listed in the IHIP.
- Either a grade for the child in each subject or a written narrative evaluating the child's progress.
- If your child did not complete at least 80% of the planned coursework for a subject this quarter, please include a short explanation of why.

For Grades 9-12: A minimum of 990 instructional hours per year is required, averaging 247.5 hours per quarter.

**Submission:** Submit the Quarterly Report (QR) as a PDF in a separate email to <a href="mailto:homeschool@schools.nyc.gov">homeschool@schools.nyc.gov</a> with the subject line: QR, your child's name, and NYC Student ID Number (if available).

Note: Progress reports from online programs will not be accepted as a quarterly report.
