



Admissions Timeline

- October 1: High School Admissions Opens
 - High School Application
 - Fiorello H. LaGuardia High School Application
 - Registration for the Specialized High Schools Admissions Test (SHSAT)
- October 18: Deadline to register for the SHSAT
- December 4:
 - Deadline to submit a high school application and LaGuardia application
 - Deadline to submit assessments and auditions
- March 6:
 - High School Offers and SHSAT/LGA results become available
 - Waitlists open





Audition Programs

Common Components schools.nyc.gov/HSAuditions

- 25 high schools offer audition programs. They all (including LaGuardia) use the same common audition components for each discipline.
- Families can submit virtual auditions directly in MySchools. Some programs may also offer an in-person option for auditions.
- The same common audition components will be used for virtual or in-person auditions.



Audition

What To Do

1. Audition

- Learn how: Schools.nyc.gov/HSAuditions
- Submit your virtual auditions in MySchools by December 4.

2. Apply

- Also list each audition program of interest on your high school application.
- To apply to LaGuardia, submit a LaGuardia application by December 4. (LaGuardia programs are not on the regular high school application.)



How Offers Are Made

- Each school scores auditions using their own criteria
- Offers are made in score order
- ONLY LaGuardia High School also considers a student's grades.
 Students must have a 65 in all their core course subjects as indicated on their final June 2024 report card.

Screened with Assessment



What to Do

- I. Complete the program's required assessment by December 4. Learn more at
 - Some schools' assessments must be uploaded directly in MySchools
 - Other schools' assessments must be submitted directly to the school
- 2. List each program of interest on your application

How Offers Are Made

- High schools will score their own assessments.
- A student's grades and their score for the assessment will be combined using a weighted average.
- Students are admitted in descending order of the combined, weighted average.

What to Do

 List programs of interest on your application. There is nothing else you need to do.

How Offers Are Made

- Schools rank students based on characteristics such as:
 - Home Language
 - English Language Learning Status
 - Years in NYC
- Offers are made based on each school's ranking


What to Do

List programs of interest on your application. There is nothing else you need to do.

How Offers Are Made

Students are assigned a category (high, middle, low) based on their seventh-grade grades.

Offers are made evenly to students across each category.



Screened Programs



What to Do: List programs of interest on your application. There is nothing else you need to do.

How Offers are Made: Screened programs admit top-performing applicants across each middle school and citywide.

Screened Programs



How Offers are Made

- Applicants to screened high schools will be in groups based on the average of their final seventhgrade core course grades.
- Students will be admitted to screened programs in group order, starting with students in group one.
- You can see which group your child is in on their MySchools profile.

What to Do: List programs of interest on your application. There is nothing else you need to do.

How Offers Are Made

- At Open programs, students are randomly selected for seats.
- At Zoned programs, students who live in the school's zone receive offers.

Priority Groups

- 1. Queens students or residents
- 2. New York City residents















How are Random Numbers used in admissions?

Used in cases where there are more applicants than seats available at a specific program.

How Offers Are Made

Random numbers are used in admissions to determine the order in which students are matched to schools during admissions. These numbers are sorted in numeric and then alphabetical order like this: 0, 1, 2 ... 9, A, B, C, D, E, F.

For example, when the following two random numbers are sorted, the number that begins with "5" would be considered for an offer first at a specific program:

- 5B1920AF-F1C6-40EC-8E9A-3E1E50CB13BB
- B51920AF-F1C6-40EC-8E9A-3E1E50CB13BB






How Random Numbers are used in admissions






 Applicants are arranged in numeric order (random number) within their priority group

How Random Numbers used in admissions



- The application preference order then determine which students will receive an offer:
 - Any student who matches to another program listed higher on their application than this program will no longer be considered for this program.


How Random Numbers used in admissions



Ed Opt Programs


Within each ed opt category (High, Middle Low) students are considered for offers based on their random number for one-third of seats at each program Students still receive offers in priority group order, if applicable Information on Ed Opt categories is available on our

website.



Open Programs

Students are considered for offers based on their random number Students still receive offers in priority group order, if applicable How are students considered for offers at open programs




Screened Programs

Students are positioned in order of screened admissions group, starting with group 1. Within each admissions group, students are considered for offers based on their random number.

Building Your Application



New This Year: Chances of Offer!

MySchools will now let you know what your child's chances are of receiving an offer to specific programs. You will see indicators of **low, medium or high chance.**

This feature is personalized for each student and based on factors such as:

- The program's admissions methods
- Number of available seats
- Your child's screened admissions group or Educational Option category
- Your child's random number
- Whether your child is in the General Education (GE) or Students with Disabilities (SWD) seat group



Chances of Offer!

When you start your high school application in MySchools, you will be able to see your chance of getting an offer in two places: the search page and the application builder.

- A "high" icon showing three orange bars means that a student is expected to have a high chance of receiving an offer to this program. Students have a 99% chance of receiving an offer to a program that shows three bars.
- A "medium" icon showing two orange bars means that the student is expected to have a medium chance of receiving an offer to this program. About half of students will receive an offer to a program that shows two bars.
- A "low" icon showing just one orange bar means that the student is expected to have a low chance of receiving an offer to this program. Students have a 1% chance of receiving an offer to a program that shows one bar.

New: Additional Choices on High School Application!

- This year, families will have the opportunity of indicating more than 12 choices on their high school application.
- This is optional, you do not need to list more choices if you do not want to.
- You should still consider indicating 12 programs on your high school application that you are interested in.
- If you are interested in more than 12 programs, please use this option and list as many programs as you would like!
- All programs indicated should be listed in your true order of preference!



Tips for a Balanced Application



12 or more programs you want to attend



Not only low and medium chance programs



Some programs where you have a high chance of getting an offer

98% of students who listed 12 programs got an offer from their application!



Your Choices Matter

List programs in your order of preference, with your top choice as #1



There is NO downside to listing programs in your true preference order!



You will always be considered for your first choice first



High schools cannot see the order you place programs on your application

8 testing SHS — apply by taking the Specialized High Schools Admissions Test (SHSAT).

What is on the SHSAT?

The SHSAT is a timed test: 180 minutes (no breaks)

For students with extended time accommodation: 360 minutes with two 15-minute breaks

• Two sections:

- ELA section is 57 multiple choice questions.
- Math section is 52 multiple choice questions and 5 "grid-in" questions.
- Two sample tests are in the Specialized High Schools Admissions Test (SHSAT)
 Practice Test for 2025 Admissions You can find more information regarding the SHSAT, including the practice tests on our website, schools.nyc.gov/SHS

- Test tickets will have test date, arrival time, and location

Registered 8th grade students who attend a public DOE middle school that terminates in the 8th grade	October 30	Current school
Registered 8th grade students who attend 6-12 schools, charter, private, parochial, or independent school schools, or who are homeschooled	Saturday, November 16th or Sunday, November 17th	Central DOE location
All registered 9th grade students.	Saturday, December 7th or Sunday, December 8th	Central DOE location

What happens after you take the SHSAT?

Offers are determined by:

- Student's SHSAT score
- Student's preference order of schoolssubmitted during registration in MySchools.
- Seat availability

Testing Specialized High Schools DO NOT review students' state test scores, grades, or attendance.






Diversty in Admissions and Chances of Receiving an Offer

Some programs prioritize students who are eligible for free-and-reduced-price lunch for a portion of seats.

After you click on the *Get Started* option for the High School Application, you will be asked to consent to your information being used for this priority. Answering yes to this question will allow a student to correctly receive a diversity in admissions priority, if they are eligible.



How are Random Numbers used in admissions?


Random numbers are used in certain cases where there are more applicants than seats.

You can see your student's random number on their profile page in MySchools. These numbers are sorted in numeric and then alphabetical order like this: 0, 1, 2 ... 9, A, B, C, D, E, F.


MySchools Event Calendar

Families, prospective students and school staff can view the calendar on the welcome page at myschools.nyc by clicking **Upcoming Events** on the top right of the page




