- Enrollment in D1-32 schools decreased slightly in 2024-2025, remaining relatively stable compared to the steeper declines following the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Citywide, K-12 enrollment in District 1-32 schools and charter schools has declined by about 10% since its peak in the 2016-2017 school year.

• Between 2019-20 and 2024-25, three of Queens's districts experienced high school enrollment decline, whereas nine districts showed growth or remained stable.

• District 28 had the steepest enrollment decline during this time, from 14,619 in 2019-20 to 13,591 in 2024-25 (7% decline).

- District 29 had the steepest population decline, going from 14,234 students in grades 9-12 in 2019-20 to 13,443 students in 2024-25 (6% decline)

• In 2024-25, 68% of students living in 2019-20 enrolled in a district high school in the borough, about the same as in 2019-20. District 28 received 13% of students living in Queens, the highest percentage of Queens districts.

• About 12% of Queens student residents enrolled in non-public schools (about the same as in 2019-20) and 3% enrolled in charter schools (about the same as in 2019-20).

NYCPS's District 75 provides specialized instructional support for students with significant challenges, such as Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD), significant cognitive delays, emotional disability, sensory impairment, and multiple disabilities. District 75 serves students through a number of different program models.

• Most District 75 students attend Special Class programs, which operate as distinct schools and may be located in standalone sites or co-located with district schools.

• A smaller number of students attend Inclusion Programs, in which students receive District 75 services within general education classes at a district school partner.
